

Daily Prayer For Individuals and Families

Adopted from *The Lutheran Service Book (p. 294)*

The 21st of June 2020 A.D. – 3rd Sunday After Pentecost

This brief service is intended as a simple form of daily prayer for individuals and families. When more than one person is present, the versicles and responses may be spoken responsively, with one person reading the words in regular type and the others responding with the words in bold type. The Creed and Prayers that are in bold type are to be said by all.

The sign of the cross + may be made by all in remembrance of their Baptism.

Invocation

In the name of the Father and of the + Son and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

Opening Psalm Psalm 130

Out of the depths I cry to you, O LORD!

²O Lord, hear my voice! Let your ears be attentive to the voice of my pleas for mercy!

³ If you, O LORD, should mark iniquities, O Lord, who could stand?

⁴But with you there is forgiveness, that you may be feared.

⁵ I wait for the LORD, my soul waits, and in his word I hope;

⁶ my soul waits for the Lord more than watchmen for the morning, more than watchmen for the morning.

⁷O Israel, hope in the LORD! For with the LORD there is steadfast love, and with him is plentiful redemption.

⁸ And he will redeem Israel from all his iniquities.

Scripture Lesson – Matthew 10:5a, 21-33

These twelve Jesus sent out, instructing them...Brother will deliver brother over to death, and the father his child, and children will rise against parents and have them put to death, ²² and you will be hated by all for my name's sake. But the one who endures to the end will be saved. ²³ When they persecute you in one town, flee to the next, for truly, I say to you, you will not have gone through all the towns of Israel before the Son of Man comes.

²⁴ "A disciple is not above his teacher, nor a servant above his master. ²⁵ It is enough for the disciple to be like his teacher, and the servant like his master. If they have called the master of the house Beelzebul, how much more will they malign those of his household.


²⁶ "So have no fear of them, for nothing is covered that will not be revealed, or hidden that will not be known. ²⁷ What I tell you in the dark, say in the light, and what you hear whispered, proclaim on the housetops. ²⁸ And do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul. Rather fear him who can destroy both soul and body in hell. ²⁹ Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? And not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father. ³⁰ But even the hairs of your head are all numbered. ³¹ Fear not, therefore; you are of more value than many sparrows. ³² So everyone who acknowledges me before men, I also will acknowledge before my Father who is in heaven, ³³ but whoever denies me before men, I also will deny before my Father who is in heaven.

Grace, mercy, peace to you from God – the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Amen.

When I was a young boy and would fish with my father and brother, I would often count fish that I had hooked, but had failed to get into the boat or onto shore as fish that I had caught. So, when we would get home I would tell my mother something like, "I caught three fish!" when the reality was that I only caught one fish and two got away. If my father heard me telling these fish stories, he would remind me that you actually have to catch the fish to say you caught a fish, very often to which I would reply, "But I was close!" Then my father would say, "Close only counts in horseshoes and hand grenades."

Now there are other times when being close counts for something, but the famous saying seems to ring true more often than not. If you're out hunting or shooting trap or shooting baskets, close doesn't count. If you're trying to run a race, you can be close, but if you don't cross the finish line, it doesn't count. When you're paying your mortgage, your electric bill, or trying to get the garbage out to the curb in time, it's nice to be close, but as the lights get turned off or you see the city truck driving away while your left with a stinky bag of garbage for another week you realize close doesn't count.

Looking at our text for today I would think that our Lord Jesus, would tend to agree. For there in Matthew 10:22, Jesus says, "But the one who endures to the end will be saved." He doesn't just say the one who endures will be saved, but the one who endures to the end will be saved. You can't just endure for a little while and then stop enduring, or get close to the end and be saved. It's the one who endures all the way to the end! But what exactly does that mean? It's a fair question because here Jesus is not just talking about fishing or sports, or even hand grenades. Here He's talking about our salvation! So what does this idea of enduring to the end mean?

Well first, Jesus tells His disciples and all Christians that they will have to endure, because they will have to suffer the scorn of this world. Very often, when Christians read the Gospel accounts in the Bible, God's Word tells them of the suffering and humiliation of our Lord Jesus. We read of His humble birth to the Virgin Mary. We read how his half brothers and sisters thought He was out of His mind, how people rejected Him, how the religious leaders tried to kill Him, how the Roman soldiers beat, spit on and mocked Him before they crucified Him. And when Christians read this they see behind our Lord's suffering and death His great love for each and every person who has ever lived. They see this love because they know it could only be love that would cause Jesus to go through all of this for us. And that love is certainly there. But what we often fail to see behind our Lord's suffering and death, is our own suffering. Our own suffering – not because of our sin – but because we're Christians in a world and in the midst of people who have rejected Christ.

"A disciple is not above his teacher, nor a servant above his master", Jesus tells us in our text. And if they treated Jesus the way that they did, Jesus who came to show them God's love and forgiveness, who performed incredible miracles of power and mercy, if they treated Jesus the way that they did, what makes us think that the world will treat us, or any Christian better? Jesus describes just how horrible the suffering from this persecution might be. He says that the people who are the closest to us, (parents and children and siblings), may kill us because of our faith in Christ and their rejection of Him. And if this doesn't' happen, and let us pray that it never will, these extreme situations should serve as warnings to be ready to endure any persecution or any hardship because we follow Jesus in an age and a culture that is becoming increasingly hostile to our faith and to Him.

Yet we cannot just endure for a little while. We can not just suffer for our faith for a moment, and then give in or take a path of lesser resistance. A path away from Christ because it doesn't make us seem so extreme or naive or, as some opponents of the Church like to call faithful Christians, so "hateful". As a disciple of Christ we remain faithful to Him and His Word in the Scriptures until the persecution is over and until the struggle ends. And as you can imagine this can come about in many ways. Perhaps it happens through a time of peace for the Church. Perhaps it happens when we are persecuted to the point of death. For there, resting with Christ, the troubles on this side of the grave will be no more. Or perhaps the end comes about when our Lord cuts this time short and returns again with glory.

Whatever the case may be, our Lord tells us to endure until the times of trouble are over because it will be so worth it. His promise to us is that those who endure will be saved. Saved from their own sin. Saved from the power of the Evil One. Saved from both physical and eternal death in hell forever. And the salvation that Christ gives to us is so complete and full that it is often called a new life in Christ because this salvation puts to death our old sinful ways of doing things, and puts to death our fears and concerns, and makes us new creations living

according to God's will. But we have to make it to the end, because with salvation close doesn't count.

But here is the Good News. We don't have to rely upon ourselves to endure to the end. In fact, we probably need a little bit less of ourselves to endure the hardships of our faith until they are over. Because when we rely upon ourselves, when we say all of this is something that I have to do, we are placing ourselves underneath God's Law where we cannot to anything but fail. But Christ has already succeeded. He has already endured all of the persecution, all of the temptation, all of God's wrath over our sin so that we can be saved! So when we live under the Law, close doesn't count. But, because of God love and mercy and grace, Jesus counts for everything!

So, we don't rely upon our own works, but we trust in Christ. We hear and read and study His Word in the Scriptures at church and in our homes and with other faithful Christians wherever they may be. We receive the Sacraments as the gifts that they are so that we may receive God's forgiveness and have our faith strengthened. We pray. We pray that God would help us to endure and that regardless of what we see going on around us, His will would be done. Because His will is always what is best for us.

The Word of God, Baptism, Holy Communion, prayer – these are the tools that God Himself uses to help us endure to the end. Because Jesus our Lord has already done everything needed for this to happen. And through these gifts He gives us His mercy and love. Through prayer and the Means of Grace He's assured us that He will be with us to help us endure the persecutions or whatever hardship we face, so that we won't just get close, but that we actually will be a saved. Amen.
