The Creed and Prayers that are in bold type are to be said by all.

The sign of the cross + may be made by all in remembrance of their Baptism.

⁷"Blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive mercy.



Very often in life, it is helpful to learn things in a particular order. For instance, a student of Mathematics should learn how to add before she learns to multiply. Likewise, teachers may find it helpful if their students have an overview of Western Civilization, before they begin to study American History. Because of this, when I was in school, there were certain classes called, "prerequisites" that one had to have had completed before one could take another class.

Well, in our Gospel Lesson this morning from Matthew, we come across the beginning of what is know as the Sermon on the Mount. In the Sermon on the Mount, we hear some of the most well known teachings of Jesus. Teachings like His disciples being the Salt and the Light of the World, the Lord's Prayer, and what is often referred to as the *Golden Rule*. When Jesus is finished with this sermon, we are told in Matthew 7 that the crowds were *astonished* because Jesus taught with authority. Therefore it's no wonder that those three chapters in Matthew, that make us this sermon of Jesus, have always been some of the most popular passages of the Bible, because it lays out for the church what it must and must not do.

But just like learning math or history, there's some prerequisite learning that must take place before Jesus can get into all of these great teachings of what it means to be His disciple or follower. And these prerequisites are our Gospel Lesson today, what is often called the *Beatitudes*.

Matthew 5:1-2 tells us, "Seeing the crowds, He [Jesus] went up on the mountain, and when He sat down, His disciples came to Him. And He opened His mouth and taught them..." And before He told them that that everyone who looks at another person with lustful intent has committed adultery, Jesus tells them that the poor in spirit are blessed. Before He teaches His disciples that they are to love not only their neighbors, but also their enemies, Jesus teaches them that the merciful will receive mercy. Before He tells His followers to turn the other cheek, Jesus tells them that the meek are blessed because they will inherit the earth.

Jesus seems to do this because while the Sermon of the Mount describes what the disciples of Jesus are supposed to do or how they are to act, these *Beatitudes* or blessings that we read today actually make disciples. Or if someone already is a follower of Jesus, they strengthen their faith! Just look at the text for a moment. As you read through the text again, notice the pronouns. In verses 3-10, it's all "theirs" is the kingdom of Heaven, "they" will be comforted, "they" shall see God...until v.11. Then Jesus switches from the 3rd person, to the 2nd. In verse 11 He doesn't say "they" shall be blessed when they are reviled – He says "you". You see, there is a move from them being blessed to you being blessed in the Beatitudes because if you believe them, you've become a disciple of Christ, have His blessings, and are now ready to hear the rest of the Sermon on the Mount. The Beatitudes, making and strengthening disciples, are the prerequisites for the rest of Jesus' teaching.

This weekend, as the Church around the World celebrates All Saints Sunday, we need to hear these beatitudes once again – not necessarily to make disciples, but rather to strengthen our faith and trust in God. To remember that He doesn't always work according to our ways or wisdom. And that sometimes in the Kingdom of God, things aren't quite what they seem.

We need this strength because as we remember our loved ones who have died in the faith, we come face to face with death - the ultimate consequence of sin. And for many, and if we're not careful, when we remember those who had died, we may be fooled into thinking that death has won, and that death always wins; always has the last word because everyone always dies! This is of course because everyone always sins.

But in the Kingdom of God, where God rules and reigns, things are not always what they seem. Born of the virgin Mary, there was one who did not sin. As the Son of God, He nevertheless suffered and died. Having died, He rose again, so that not only could those whom we remember have forgiveness and eternal life, but all of us, and everyone who has faith in Jesus as their Lord and Savior from sin and death. Because true saints are not made by their own works or deeds, but by the work of Jesus' death and resurrection.

If we believe this and this is what we confess, then we believe what Jesus teaches us in our Gospel Lesson today. Those who mourn will be comforted. The pure in heart will see God. Those who hunger and thirst for righteousness will be satisfied. If you didn't believe it before and do now, you have been made a disciple of our Lord Jesus. If you've already believed in Jesus, take heart and be encouraged by His teachings in the Beatitudes, especially if you mourn the deaths of loved ones or struggle in the here and now of this life. For in God's Kingdom, where Jesus lives and reigns, things are not always what they seem. God became a man. That man never sinned and yet died. Though dead, He rose again to give us life and to make sinners saints. He rose so that we, and all of those who have died in the faith, may truly be blessed. Amen.
