The 19th Sunday after Pentecost

This brief service is intended as a simple form of daily prayer for individuals and families. When more than one person is present, the Psalm and other parts of the service may be spoken responsively, with one person reading the words in regular type and the others responding with the words in bold type. The Creed and Prayers that are in bold type are to be said by all.

The sign of the cross + may be made by all in remembrance of their Baptism.

Invocation

In the name of the Father and of the + Son and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

Psalm

From Psalm 74

Remember your congregation, which you have purchased of old, which you have redeemed to be the tribe of your heritage!

Remember this, O LORD, how the enemy scoffs, and a foolish people reviles your name.

Do not deliver the soul of your dove to the wild beasts; do not forget the life of your poor forever.

Let not the downtrodden turn back in shame; let the poor and needy praise your name.

Have regard for the covenant; arise, O God, defend your cause.


Scripture Lesson (Luke 18:1-8)

¹[Jesus] told them a parable to the effect that they ought always to pray and not lose heart. ²He said, "In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor respected man. ³And there was a widow in that city who kept coming to him and saying, 'Give me justice against my adversary.' ⁴For a while he refused, but afterward he said to himself, 'Though I neither fear God nor respect man, ⁵yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will give her justice, so that she will not beat me down by her continual coming." ⁶And the Lord said, "Hear what the unrighteous judge says. ⁷And will not God give justice to his elect, who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long over them? ⁸I tell you, he will give justice to them speedily. Nevertheless, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?"

The Nicene Creed

And I believe in one holy Christian and apostolic Church, I acknowledge one Baptism for the remission of sins, and I look for the resurrection of the dead and the life + of the world to come. Amen.

Grace, mercy, and peace to you from God – the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Last month I heard the former speaker of the Lutheran Hour and president of Concordia Seminary, Dr. Dale Meyer, say that when Church fails to lift Christ up for people to see Him in their lives today, people become functional atheists. This means that they may say they are Christian. And there may even be some spark of faith somewhere in their lives. But for all intents and purposes, a functional atheist lives their lives and acts as if they are unbelievers. And this can happen to someone who doesn't see Christ at work today.

So, many people seem to have adjusted themselves to a life without God. They spend little time in fellowship with Him, little time with God in His Word, little time speaking to Him in prayer – with the result that spending time with God through His Word and prayer become harder and harder to do. People have almost become strangers to God and so it is hard to listen and pray to Him.

Jesus tells His disciples in our Gospel lesson that they, as disciples, need to never give up praying. Jesus told them earlier that, "The days are coming when you will desire to see one of the days of the Son of Man, and you will not see it" (Luke 17:22). He speaks of the suffering that He must endure upon the cross to complete His plan of salvation for the world and then urges them to be ready to give up their lives. He tells the disciples that difficult times are coming, and the followers of Jesus may suppose that God is not being just or loving, because of the persecutions that He permits them to endure.

I think about this when I hear of the war in Ukraine. The aggression by Russia against the people of the Ukraine is so over the top that before it began, many people thought that such a war in Europe was impossible. But every day we see it unfolding before our eyes, and while tide of the war is currently in Ukraine's favor, every day we see the violence, the heart break, the tragedy of this war. And if you're like me you wish there was something that you could do - some action

to take. But other than supporting some charitable organizations that help the people in that region, about the only other thing that most of us can do is pray. Pray for peace, pray for the people of Ukraine. And at times that seems so little, but then I remember that is exactly what Christ would have us do!

To illustrate this point, Jesus tells a parable about an unrighteous judge. This man doesn't seem to care what God, or anyone else for that matter, thinks about him. He arrogantly thinks he is above the law - both God's and man's. We don't like people like this, do we? But this judge is being pestered by a widow. She wants the judge to give her justice in dealing with her adversary. Now it is interesting, because Jesus could not have picked two people who differ more in society to be the characters in this parable. The judge is a powerful man in society, probably wealthy and somewhat feared. The widow has absolutely nothing, nothing except her persistence. And through her persistence, even though the judge did not help her at first, she beat the judge down. In the original Greek language, the judge says he will give her justice so that the widow will not give him "a black eye"! This poor widow gave the judge an old fashion beat down, not with violence, but with her persistence. Apparently he does care about his reputation among men after all! And Jesus says if this is what happens with the unrighteous judge, this unsavory character, just imagine what happens when God hears our prayers that come to Him day and night. If the unrighteous judge acts justly, just think of how our God acts. And so Jesus tells us to pray.

We pray with a sure and confident hope that we will be heard, because like the judge in the parable, God does care about His reputation. God will and must be true to Himself and His Word. The Word that promises that His will is always done. His Word that promises that He will always give us our daily bread, when and how we need it for our benefit. His Word that promises that He will deliver us from all of the evil that we and the rest of His people suffer this day. Whether that evil be from those who hate us because of our faith in God or evil that comes from living in a sinful and fallen world - we pray for God to deliver us and know that He will hear and answer those prayers.

But when we do pray in the midst of these evils and it seems as if God is not listening, remember God is patient. The time of deliverance for His faithful saints will indeed come, even though it seem delayed from our perspective. But it will come. God's time is not our time. He is patient and compassionate. So that even if we face the utmost evil of death itself, we can have peace knowing that we have already been saved. For God kept His Word to send a Savior – it is the same person who was teaching this parable to those around Him – Jesus Christ. Whose death on the cross not only saved us from our sin by shifting God's wrath for our sin from us to His own Son, but also fulfilled God's promise to deliver His people. And just like the promise to send Jesus the first time as a baby born in Bethlehem, Jesus has promised to be with us today through His Word and Sacraments and has promised to return again visibly on the Last Day. Like the saints of the Old Testament, we live in an era where we wait for Jesus to visibly come. While they waited, that did not mean that God wasn't with them, just as our waiting doesn't mean God isn't with us. He is with you, so don't live like an atheist. But wait and pray with patience. Don't adjust yourself to a life without God's presence or believing that He doesn't care for you. Because our God, a righteous judge, hears our prayers and promises always to be with us and all His people. Amen.

And now may the peace of God that surpasses all understanding, keep your hearts and minds forever in Christ Jesus, our Lord. Amen
