The 3rd Sunday after Pentecost

This brief service is intended as a simple form of daily prayer for individuals and families. When more than one person is present, the Psalm and other parts of the service may be spoken responsively, with one person reading the words in regular type and the others responding with the words in bold type. The Creed and Prayers that are in bold type are to be said by all.

The sign of the cross + may be made by all in remembrance of their Baptism.

Scripture Lesson

(*Matthew 9:35-10:8*)

³⁵Jesus went throughout all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the gospel of the kingdom and healing every disease and every affliction. ³⁶When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. ³⁷Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; ³⁸therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest."

¹And he called to him his twelve disciples and gave them authority over unclean spirits, to cast them out, and to heal every disease and every affliction. ²The names of the twelve apostles are these: first, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother; James the son of Zebedee, and John his brother; ³Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the tax collector; James the son of Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus; ⁴Simon the Cananaean, and Judas Iscariot, who betrayed him.

⁵These twelve Jesus sent out, instructing them, "Go nowhere among the Gentiles and enter no town of the Samaritans, ⁶but go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. ⁷And proclaim as you go, saying, 'The kingdom of heaven is at hand.' ⁸Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse lepers, cast out demons. +A Compassionate Shepherd +

Many of you may recall that at the beginning of the church year in December, the church centers its worship mostly around the life of Christ with Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent and Easter. But beginning with Pentecost, we sort of shift our attention, not away from Christ, but rather to how Christ works within His Church. Our Scripture reading therefore is an excellent text for this time of year, for in it we see this shift from Christ Himself to Christ at work in the Church.

We begin of course with Christ, as He is traveling all over the place teaching, preaching the Gospel, and healing people of their diseases. Matthew immediately tells us why Jesus is doing all of this. After all, why should Jesus put all those miles on His tired feet when we could just go right to Good Friday and get it all over with? Matthew tells us Jesus traveled and preached because He had compassion on the people He saw. He had compassion on them because they were harassed and helpless, literally torn and thrown down. We find that the Jewish people Jesus was teaching were like sheep without a shepherd. This is a common picture the Bible paints for us, one that is made all the more real with that had happened when I was living in Pennsylvania.

In 2005, a man in Allentown, PA was charged with Cruelty to Animals for leaving 130 sheep in a pen without food or water. This is tragic, literal example of sheep without a shepherd, for three of them died, three sheep had to be euthanized, and almost all were malnourished. Eventually the sheep escaped only to wonder aimlessly and helplessly through the nearby woods and onto a state highway.

I remember when I first heard this news I felt terrible for those poor sheep. I imagined these fuzzy little creatures in pain from their hunger, watching their friends die, getting lost in the woods, and dodging speeding cars. Perhaps hearing about them yourself, you can begin to imagine what Jesus must have felt for the children of Israel who had no shepherd. The difference here is that Israel's shepherd did not leave them. Rather those sheep left the Shepherd. Even though they had Moses and all the prophets who constantly reminded them that God would watch over and take care of them, they rebelled against Him and wanted to trust in themselves. They didn't want to rely upon God, they wanted to rely upon themselves – their wisdom or their strength. And having left their Shepherd they wandered far away from the very things they were looking for – Salvation and God's favor.

How many people today do we come across [at work, at school, or among our friends] who wander around aimlessly trying to earn salvation or God's favor. They fall for every new self-help book or spiritual fad and in doing so turn their backs on the one thing that can give them what they are looking for. They, like the Jews of old, want to rely upon themselves and in doing so imagine they are Gods and commit all sorts of evil. Not necessarily evil such as murder, but evil in separating themselves from God. Helping to lead others away from God. Just think of all things that go on these days on Sunday.

But there is Good News. The Good News that we have a shepherd who does not leave His sheep. A Good Shepherd who, even though the sheep leave Him, works to bring them back. St. Paul writes, "For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly …but God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:6,8)

While all of Israel were lost sheep, while you were a lost sheep, and while there are millions of lost sheep out in the world today, Jesus Christ died to save them. He died because as we read, God loves us and He has compassion for us. It is a love and compassion that sent our Shepherd to die on the cross. It is a love and compassion that desires to give us all good things. Jesus says that a thief comes to kill and destroy, but He came so that you may have life and have it abundantly! He came so that you won't have to starve or thirst, but may find yourself in green pastures and besides cool waters. Though you may have to walk down a state highway at times in life, you will have to fear no evil, for Jesus is with you and protects you. All of this is offered freely without any merit or worthiness of our own, but because of God's love and compassion.

This love and compassion are powerful. So much so that they take away the tragedy of the lost sheep. In fact, when Jesus sees the lost sheep, He sees an opportunity. He says, "The harvest is plentiful." There are many who may be brought into the Kingdom of Heaven and for reasons only known to Him, Christ chooses us to help. He says, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into His harvest" (Matthew 9:37-38). Immediately Jesus commissions the twelve disciples to do His ministry. They are to teach, preach, heal, drive out demons, and even raise the dead. In short, they are to do everything that Christ Himself had done. Their mission as disciples is Christ's mission. And your work as Christ's disciples is His work as well. To be sure not all of us are called to be teachers in the church, or preachers, or ushers, or choir members – just as not all of us are called to be mothers or fathers, or police officers or engineers in our secular vocations. But just as we

are to all work hard and for the benefit of others in our worldly jobs, so too are we all to show love and compassion to all those around us. For this love and compassion started with Jesus Christ and was given to us freely by Him. Now we give it freely to others. For the harvest is plentiful, the work is indeed great, there are many lost sheep in the world today, and most importantly our Good Shepherd has shown us compassion. Amen.
