Adopted from The Lutheran Service Book (p. 294)

January 14, 2024 A.D. - 2nd Sunday after the Epiphany

This brief service is intended as a simple form of daily prayer for individuals and families. When more than one person is present, the psalm and responses may be spoken responsively, with one person reading the words in regular type and the others responding with the words in bold type.

The Creed and Prayers that are in bold type are to be said by all.

Scripture Lesson (I Corinthians 6:12-20)

12"All things are lawful for me," but not all things are helpful. "All things are lawful for me," but I will not be enslaved by anything. ¹³"Food is meant for the stomach and the stomach for food"—and God will destroy both one and the other. The body is not meant for sexual immorality, but for the Lord, and the Lord for the body. ¹⁴And God raised the Lord and will also raise us up by his power. ¹⁵Do you not know that your bodies are members of Christ? Shall I then take the members of Christ and make them members of a prostitute? Never! ¹⁶Or do you not know that he

who is joined to a prostitute becomes one body with her? For, as it is written, "The two will become one flesh." ¹⁷But he who is joined to the Lord becomes one spirit with him. ¹⁸Flee from sexual immorality. Every other sin a person commits is outside the body, but the sexually immoral person sins against his own body. ¹⁹Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, ²⁰for you were bought with a price. So glorify God in your body.

Grace, mercy, and peace to you from God – the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Amen.

There is a tendency today to think of Christianity, and perhaps religion in general, as only a spiritual endeavor. But, if you have ever gone to the cemetery after a Christian funeral you may have heard the pastor or priest say, "May God the Father, who created this body; may God the Son, who by his blood redeemed this body; may God the Holy Spirit, who by Holy Baptism sanctified this body to be his temple, keep these remains to the day of the resurrection of all flesh. Amen." These words, spoken at the Committal in the Service of Christian Burial proclaim the truth about the body of the believer in this sober moment. They remind us that there is much more to our faith than just the spiritual - that our physical bodies are created by the Maker of heaven and earth, purchased back from sin with the blood of Christ, and made holy once again through the power of God's Word and Sacraments. The bodies of our deceased loved ones are not mere corpses to be discarded and forgotten. On the contrary, our bodies are given to us by God.

Our bodies are our bodies. Yours is uniquely you. But nevertheless, Scripture tells us that it does not belong to you. You did not create yourself. And while we know of, and perhaps benefit from all sorts of medical breakthroughs today, we still must ultimately face the reality that we are flesh and blood and will perish.

As we live our lives, there are those in the world who want to deny the biblical truth that we are not our own. They view the body as simply a vehicle that houses our spirit. They will tell us to treat our bodies as instruments to obtain as many physical pleasures or avoid as much pain, as we can before we die. If we think like this, than should we be surprised that once the flesh begins to break down we seek ways to be relieved of this burden? This is where euthanasia and assisted suicide enter in. If we can't finally master the body and control the suffering of disease and old age, we will put an end to it at the time and place of our own choosing. Proponents of

euthanasia will speak of people "dying with dignity" or "taking their own lives" as though dignity were a god that we would want to cling to at death or their lives were theirs to take.

And so what do we do with our bodies? That's a question faced not just at the time of death but here and now as we live in the body. This was the case with the Corinthians, who apparently thought that something as physical as their bodies could not affect life in the Spirit. Christian Freedom in the Spirit translated into a life unhampered by rules, boundaries, and limitations. Homosexual practice, prostitution, and even incest were now all fair game to the Corinthians, as long as it felt right and didn't "hurt anyone".

Perhaps the ancient Corinthians reasoned that the bounds of Christian liberty were wide and expansive since even St. Paul wrote, "Food is meant for the stomach and the stomach for food – and God will destroy both". Or it could be that the Corinthians fell into the trap of ancient Gnosticism, believing that the Gospel was a teaching of liberation from the body – that the spirit and spiritual things are good, while the body and physical things are bad. Death was then viewed as a good thing since it liberated the spirit from the physical world.

Even amongst Christians today we hear that something as mundane as sexual ethics should not get in the way of the Gospel and the Mission of the Church! The Church, some will say, needs a vision that is more relational and spiritual and less physical. This was the very same argument that led a Lutheran church body to adopt policies that run counter to God's Word.

Yet the apostle Paul takes a position and asserts a vision for the church and for each individual Christian that is very physical indeed. He writes, "The body is not meant for sexual immorality, but for the Lord, and the Lord for the body". What you do with your body does matter! Paul again says, "Do you not know that your bodies are members of Christ?" For Paul it is a matter of ownership. You simply cannot take the body that belongs to Christ - bought with His blood and washed by His Spirit in Baptism – and join that body to a prostitute. To do so, Paul says, is to sin against your own body. Hence, he says, "Flee from sexual immorality". Flee from the pornography on your computers and phones. Flee from the strip clubs and shows on television and in the movies that promote and condone sexual promiscuity. If you have fallen into these traps, or even if you have walked into them with your eyes wide open, turn away from them now and seek God's forgiveness in Christ - He will forgive you. But don't continue walking in this sinful way, thinking that it is normal or harmless. For every other sin a person commits is outside of his or her body – but this sin is against your body – the very same body that God has created, redeemed, and sanctified.

And Christ Jesus will not have the body that belongs to Him rendered unclean, desecrated by fornication, and enslaved to a fleshly union to one who is not your spouse. Christ Jesus would not have you live in bondage to another lord, for He has made you His own. As Luther says in his explanation to the Second Article of the Apostles' Creed: Christ has "purchased and won you from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His innocent suffering and death, that you may be His own and live under Him in His kingdom and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness."

Therefore your body will never be discarded, even at death. God has paid the ultimate price for it, the life of His Son Jesus Christ. Your body is neither evil nor irrelevant, but will be raised again to live in glory for all eternity, with the same Christ who purchased you. Then as now, your body belongs to the Lord, so that for this life already the apostle says "glorify God in your body". Your body is the place of the Spirit, and it is destined for the resurrection of the flesh.

So now, present your bodies as the living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God. For this, Paul says, is your spiritual worship (Romans 12:1). Amen.
