First Sunday in Lent

This brief service is intended as a simple form of daily prayer for individuals and families. When more than one person is present, the psalm and responses may be spoken responsively, with one person reading the words in regular type and the others responding with the words in bold type. The Creed and Prayers that are in bold type are to be said by all.

The sign of the cross ✝ may be made by all in remembrance of their Baptism.

(From Psalm 91)

When he calls to me, I will answer him; I will be with him in trouble;

I will rescue him and honor him.

Scripture Lesson

(Matthew 4:1-11)

¹Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. ²And after fasting forty days and forty nights, he was hungry. ³And the tempter came and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread." ⁴But he answered, "It is written,

*“Man shall not live by bread alone,
but by every word that comes from the mouth of God.”*

⁵Then the devil took him to the holy city and set him on the pinnacle of the temple ⁶and said to him, “If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down, for it is written,

“He will command his angels concerning you,’

and

*“On their hands they will bear you up,
lest you strike your foot against a stone.”*

⁷Jesus said to him, “Again it is written, ‘You shall not put the Lord your God to the test.’”

⁸Again, the devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their glory. ⁹And he said to him, “All these I will give you, if you will fall down and worship me.” ¹⁰Then Jesus said to him, “Be gone, Satan! For it is written,

✠ Passing the Test ✠

Grace, mercy, and peace to you from God the Father and our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

Today, there are certain jobs, certain vocations, that require those who have them to pass tests to qualify for such positions. For instance, a firefighter may be required to climb a tall ladder while she is carrying a hose or a some other heavy weight. A secretary may have to show that he can type so many words per minute. And it seems that the more responsibility that comes along with the job, the harder the tests are. Some of us may have taken a class that lasts a few hours to be certified in First Aid, but to be a doctor one must go to school for years and pass a sorts of exams and tests.

In our Gospel lesson this morning we find Jesus facing a type of exam or a test. And being tempted in the wilderness by Satan, all of creation will see if He is qualified for the task that He came into our world for.

St. Matthew writes that the temptation of Jesus took place immediately following the baptism of Jesus. Chapter three of Matthew's Gospel ends with the newly baptized Christ coming up out of the Jordan River. The water drips off of Jesus onto the dry ground, the Holy Spirit

descends upon Him in the form of a dove and voice from heaven proclaims, “*This is my Son, whom I love, with Him I am well pleased.*” Jesus was baptized to show that He was set apart for a very specific purpose: to be the Savior of the world. To be the One who would restore a sinful and fallen creation back to God. And when Spirit came down upon Jesus and the Father spoke from Heaven, creation was reassured that Jesus really is the Savior God has chosen for the world.

But will it work? Will Jesus not just be the world’s deliverer, but will He do it in the right way, the way that it has to be done? Matthew says that immediately the same Spirit that landed on Christ at His baptism, led Him out into the desert to be tempted by the Devil. The fact the Holy Spirit is leading Jesus shows us that, however unpleasant the experience might seem to be at first, there is a divine purpose for what will happen.

By now you know that after Jesus fasted for forty days and forty nights, much the same way that Israel wandered the desert for 40 years, the Devil approached Him. He brings three temptations: turn stones into bread; jump off of the temple and let the angels catch Jesus; and bow down and worship him. These tests may seem rather odd, or even silly, that is until we realize that they are not about bread or angels or kneeling. Rather Satan, the great deceiver, is trying to lure Jesus away from being the kind of Savior that we need, to one that we would want or expect.

If we need someone to rescue us in our lives we want someone who is strong, powerful, and smart. That’s why we make sure firefighters can climb ladders and doctors can pass anatomy tests. But Jesus doesn’t save us from our sins by being powerful or wise according to worldly standards. Rather it is in Christ’s weakness and humility that we find our salvation. This Lenten season we remember how Christ humbled Himself in order to save us. He was God in Heaven, God of God, light of light, very God of very God, begotten not made, one substance with the Father with all the power and glory that belonged to Him as such. But for all of us, and for our salvation, He came down from Heaven and was made a simple man, who becomes tired, thirsty, hungry, and even dies. It doesn’t sound very heroic, does it?

But this is exactly what God had chosen Jesus to do. This is what it meant to be God’s Messiah or Christ and it is exactly what we and the rest of the world that sins so desperately need. But Satan says, “Come on Jesus, I know you’re hungry so turn these rocks into bread and use your power to serve your own needs.” He says, “Jesus, show everyone how powerful you really are and all the miraculous things you can do by throwing yourself off of the temple and having angels come down and save you. That would really impress the people.” And finally, “You know where you’re going Jesus, your going to the wickedness of the cross where you will be forsaken by God. Let’s strike a deal, worship me and you’ll have your precious creation back.” The temptation of Christ is not merely a test to see if Jesus will sin, it is a test to see if He will go to the cross to die for sinners – go to the cross for you, me, and the rest of the world. And it is a test He passed with flying colors because of His love for each one of us.

This same love today calls us through our own weaknesses and struggles in life, to the One who lives and reigns in Heaven with all power and glory. The devil is always tempting us to flex our own muscles. To say that death and loss are natural parts of life. That if God loved you, He wouldn’t let this or that happen. But facing the devil’s temptations, whatever they may be, we know that Christ has already defeated Satan and gives His victory to us. So now, we use that joy, and that love, to live as His forgiven and His free, and his victorious people.

The temptation of Jesus was the ultimate test. But by passing it, Jesus showed that He was ready for the job that had the ultimate responsibility: saving the world. He would go on to do this the only way it could be done, by His death on the cross. This is what was written in the Scriptures, the same Scriptures Jesus used to show Satan why He would die humbly, and not glorify Himself.

Today, God continues to invite all people to share in His victory. To remember that through our weaknesses we may become strong in Christ when we trust in Him alone. And that through His own weakness on the cross, Jesus Christ became our Lord and Savior, the One who lives and reigns with all the power and glory in heaven forever and ever, so that we might be His own. Amen.
